Keynotes



Daniel Tisch Echevarria, APR, FCPRS, ICD.D

President & CEO, Ontario Chamber of Commerce

Daniel Tisch is a business, public policy, and community leader, having held executive roles in government and the corporate sector, and senior governance roles at public institutions and non-profit associations. He is known globally as an expert in corporate communications, public policy, community engagement, crisis and reputation management.

From 2003 to 2023, Daniel was the driving force in building Argyle Communications (now Changemakers) into Canada's largest management-owned engagement, communication and reputation advisory firm growing to \$40M in revenue, 175 employees and ten North American offices by 2023. Earlier in his career, Daniel held senior communications roles in the Canadian government, including serving as Senior Policy Advisor and Acting Chief of Staff to Canada's Minister of Foreign Affairs. In the latter role, he was a member of the Canadian delegation to the G7 Economic Summit. Daniel has spoken to business audiences on every continent, lectured at Queen's University's Smith School of Business since 1996, and contributed to leading public relations and marketing textbooks. He appears regularly in print and broadcast media, including weekly commentary on CBC Radio and Global News during the 2019 and 2021 Canadian federal elections. In 2021, Daniel was named one of the world's "top 100" social media influencers on public relations.

Born in Spain to a Latin American family and raised in Toronto, Daniel speaks English, French and Spanish. He holds two degrees from Queen's University – a Bachelor of Arts in Political Studies and a Master of Business Administration. He is also a certified corporate director, with an ICD.D designation in corporate governance from the University of Toronto. Daniel has served as vice chair of the Queen's University Board of Trustees, a leader in the international Scouting movement and a board member of Social Venture Partners International.

In 2025, Daniel was awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal for his contributions to his community, the province and the country.

He serves on several Boards of Directors, including the Global Centre for Pluralism, and the Four Pillars Society, and is co-Chair of the National Council for Reconciliation.

His career has addressed Indigenous health, residential schools, law, reconciliation, and governance. He is a member of the Order of Canada, and the Order of Ontario, and has honorary doctorates from several Canadian universities. He is a citizen of Animakee Wa Zhing #37 First Nation in northwestern Ontario.

MPP Coe is also Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Children, Community and Social Services, and the Chair of the Legislature's Standing Committee on Justice Policy.

She is deeply committed to expanding access to education as a catalyst for both economic and social development.

Dr. Vaughan currently serves as Chair of the Committee of Presidents for Colleges Ontario, Chair of the eCampusOntario Board of Directors, and Chair of the Ontario Genomics Board of Directors. She is also a Director on the SkillsOntario Board of Directors, the Ontario Regional Representative on the Colleges and Institutes Canada (CICan) Board of Directors, and an Observer on the NGEN Board of Directors. She previously served as an Honorary Colonel with the Royal Canadian Air Force, 426 Training Squadron and continues to champion Military-Connected Campus initiatives that support veterans, serving members, and their families while strengthening Canada's defence talent pipeline.

Dr. Vaughan began her career in student leadership and holds a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Education from Memorial University, a Master of Arts in Higher Education from the University of British Columbia, and a Doctorate in Higher Education Leadership from the University of Calgary.

Val Walker leads the Business + Higher Education Roundtable (BHER), a non-partisan, not-for-profit organization that brings together some of Canada's largest companies and leading post-secondary institutions. As CEO, Val drives BHER's strategic direction, steers member and stakeholder relations, and leads a high-performing team committed to creating opportunity through collaboration in Canada's skills, talent, and innovation ecosystems.

Val was inaugural co-chair of the Future Skills Council, a group established by the Government of Canada to advise on national and regional skills development and training priorities. She has also served as a member of the Guiding Coalition to the Government of Alberta's Alberta 2030: Building Skills for Jobs initiative and of Employment and Social Development Canada's Advisory Committee on Learning.

Prior to leading BHER, Val was Vice President, Innovation and Skills, at the Business Council of Canada where BHER was founded, and was Director of Policy at Mitacs. She holds a PhD from McGill University and is an alumna of the Government of Canada's Recruitment of Policy Leaders Program.



Dr. Lynn Wells

President and Vice-Chancellor of Laurentian University

Dr. Lynn Wells is a Canadian scholar, teacher and university leader, with nearly 20 years of experience in senior academic leadership positions. In April 2024, Dr. Wells became the 12th President and Vice-Chancellor of Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario, Canada.

Dr. Wells served as Provost and Vice-President Academic at Brock University from 2020 to 2023, where she also held a concurrent appointment as Interim President and Vice-Chancellor for fifteen months. Prior to 2020, she was the inaugural Associate Vice-President, Students and Teaching at MacEwan University in Edmonton and held senior positions at the University of Regina, including Acting Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Associate Vice-President Academic. For seven years, Dr. Wells worked directly with Indigenous people and communities through her service as Vice-President Academic and Special Advisor to the President at First Nations University of Canada. As a leader, Dr. Wells has demonstrated her commitment to key issues such as national reconciliation, equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility. Dr. Wells is a respected scholar in her field of Contemporary British Fiction, having published two books and numerous articles. She holds a Master's in English and a B.A. Honours (summa cum laude) in English and French Studies from York University, along with a PhD in English from Western University.

Elder Whabagoon

Obishikokang, Lac Seul First Nation Treaty 3 Territory

Whabagoon is an Ojibwe elder and sits with the Loon Clan. She is a current member of Obishikokang – Lac Seul First Nation while residing in Toronto for the past 47 years. She is a Keeper of Sacred Pipes, speaker, land defender and water protector. Whabagoon is of Sapay lineage and is a Sixties Scoop survivor.

In April 2023, Elder Whabagoon was appointed First Peoples Leadership Advisor to the General Manager, Transportation Services, City of Toronto. A landmark engagement, this Indigenous advisory role is the first of its kind for the City.

In 2021-2022, Elder Whabagoon held the inaugural role of First Peoples Leadership Advisor to the Dean at the Daniels Faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design at the University of Toronto. She initiated and curated “ambe magda” the first Indigenous mural at 1 Spadina Crescent, with Que Rock, honouring the 215 children found in unmarked graves at the residential school in Kamloops, British Columbia in May 2021.

Elder Whabagoon spends her summer months as the co-founder and Elder for the award-winning Nikibii Dawadinna Giigwag (NDG). In its eighth year, NDG is a culturally grounded Indigenous youth employment pathway to post-secondary programs focussed on landscape, architecture, and urban design. “Our youth need to connect with the land and water through spirit,” says Elder Whabagoon. “The program strengthens their cultural identity, gives a platform for their voice on environmental issues and guides them to envision their future role as caretakers of Mother Earth.”

In 2022, she was nominated for the BBVA Foundation’s Frontiers of Knowledge Award in the Music and Opera category for her ground-breaking collaboration with Tapestry Opera for the world premiere of the first Indigenous opera Shanawdithit. Elder Whabagoon is a recipient of a Lifetime Membership from the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects (CSLA), an honour also bestowed upon the Honourable Murray Sinclair-ba and King Charles III (formerly Prince Charles), for her dedication to advancing the cause of landscape architecture through her advisory roles, mentorship, and advocacy for Indigenous youth.

Elder Whabagoon leads water ceremonies and water talks to hold space for those who want to learn about the power of ceremony, land, and water. She speaks, sings, and drums for special occasions across the City of Toronto. In her spare time, she enjoys writing, and reading.

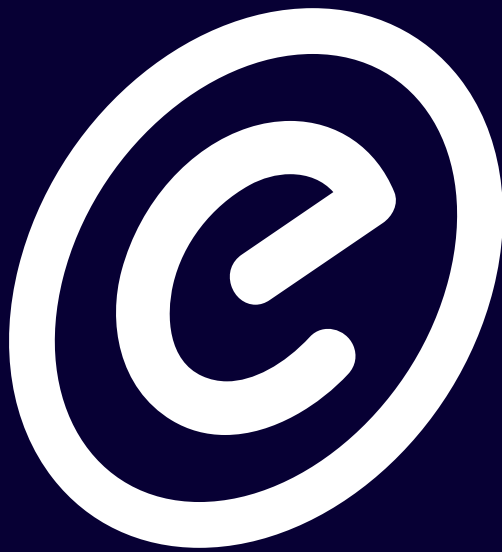
